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

Shift of the dial, hopefully in the right direction

Austerity. Food banks. Hostile environment. PPI contracts for cronies. Partygate. Strikes. Cost of living and energy crisis. Liz Truss. Suella Braverman. The betting scandal.

Everyone knew it was time for a change from this tired old government. But what of its replacement? Will it be a new, or a false dawn?

It could be said voting is a bit of a gamble on the future. For some, Keir Starmer was just the least worst option. For the more optimistic, the new government offers a chance to reset the dial to a more caring, inclusive, stable and compassionate society.

Key parts of Labour's manifesto relevant to social work are set out on page 16 of this magazine.
